Naomi: A women's dance to contemporary music showing the spirit of modern Israel. Shibbolet Basadeh: The harvesting of the sheaves of wheat is an occasion for rejoicing. Mi Li Yiten?: Who will give me love?

Dayagim: An old favorite, the dance of the fishermen.

KOCHAVIM

Mishal: Movements in this dance reflect the influence of the surrounding Arab nations. Ma Avarech: A song which became popular in Israel after the Six Day War. An angel bestows blessings upon a growing child.

Sapari: A Yemenite dance to a traditional song by Shalom Shabbazi, the beloved medieval poet of Yemen.

HAMAKOR ISRAELI DANCE TROUPE

Hanoded: This suite begins with a stark representation of the rejection and wandering of the Jews in exile throughout the ages, and their eventual ingathering from the corners of the earth. They return to the State of Israel and celebrate the beginning of a new life in their homeland. After the joyousness of their return, they pause to reflect upon the peaceful beauty of the cool, fragrant evening and then burst into exuberant dance in celebration of their homecoming and in anticipation of a bright future.
